Speakers

Maggie Eisenberger is FCER's Travel/Science Director. She has a Master's Degree in Tropical Ecology from the Whitney R Harris World Ecology Center at University of Missouri-St. Louis. She is AMS Montessori certified 6-9, trained at COMETT, has 33 years teaching experience (pre-K–12th, except 5th) and is recently retired from teaching high school science and math. She has received several teaching awards, including the St. Louis Zoo's Teacher of the Year Award. She served six years on the board of directors of Save The Rainforest and served 18 years on the steering committee of St. Louis Rainforest Advocates. Maggie has led many trips to Central and South America in the past 20 years.

Elizabeth Henke is the Program Director of the Montessori Institute for the Science of Peace. After graduating from St. Olaf College with a triple major in studio art, peace studies, and education she obtained the AMI elementary diploma in Bergamo, Italy and went on to pioneer the upper elementary program on the tiny South Pacific island of Saipan. She taught in the humanities department at the Montessori High School at University Circle (Cleveland, OH) for two years prior to receiving her Master's in Peace Education from the United Nations mandated University for Peace in Costa Rica. Upon returning from UPEACE, she co-founded MISP and continues to work for the realization of Montessori's constructive vision of peace through education as Aidan Montessori's resident Peace Educator in Washington, D.C.

David Kahn has been Executive Director of the North American Montessori Teachers' Association for more than 40 years. He has 17 years of Montessori teaching experience, 12 of them as teaching principal at Ruffing Montessori School (Cleveland Heights, OH). Mr. Kahn was Founding Program Director of the Hershey Montessori School adolescent program on the farm in Huntsburg, OH

and Founding Executive Director of Montessori High School at University Circle (Cleveland, OH). He is now working to establish a public-private partnership for a Montessori school serving ages 18 months through 18 years in Cleveland. He also developed a summer institute titled A Montessori Orientation to Adolescent Studies to help teachers specializing in working with students ages 12 to 18. Mr. Kahn holds a BA in Fine Arts and Classics from the University of Notre Dame (IN) as well as the AMI Elementary Diploma from Bergamo, Italy.

Dr. Jeff Norris is a member of FCER's research and curriculum design team. A long time resident of Costa Rica, Jeff is also the owner/operator of Natural Solutions – Costa Rica, the environmental education and ecotourism company that manages FCER's trips in Costa Rica. Most of his professional life has been dedicated to classroom education (over 12 years) in both US and Costa Rica schools, and he has taught science, biology, and ecology courses from kindergarten through college. Jeff leads natural history tours in Costa Rica during his breaks from the classroom. Fluent in Spanish, he holds an M.Ed. in International Education through Framingham State University and a Ph.D. in Ecology from the University of Missouri-St. Louis. In a world that is more and more urban with each passing generation, Jeff's passion is to reconnect people with nature.

Mark Wainwright is the President of the Board of Directors of the Monteverde Conservation League (MCL) the organization that owns and manages the Children's Eternal Rainforest. Apart from his work with the MCL, Mark leads courses and tours in tropical ecology, and has created a variety of publications in the realm of environmental education. He has written and illustrated two books: "The Mammals of Costa Rica: a Natural History and Field Guide" (second publication 2007, Cornell University Press), and the children's book "Jungle Jumble" (second publication 2006, Fundación Neotrópica). He has illustrated more than ten field guides to reptiles, birds, mammals, amphibians, and tracks for Costa Rica, Panama, Belize, and Peru for the field guide series by Rainforest Publications. He authored a film documentary called "Rhythms in the Clouds: Conservation and Biodiversity in Monteverde, Costa Rica."

Laurie Waller is the President of FCER, a non-profit organization whose mission is to protect this wondrous rainforest in Costa Rica, one of the most biologically diverse areas in the world, by partnering with educators, schools, and students. She brings to this work her experience as an environmental educator and community activist. Laurie's early career experience was as Marketing Director for graduate programs at the University of Denver. Later she designed and created a campus habitat awarded "Best of Texas" by the National Wildlife Federation and the State of Texas Parks and Wildlife agency and created an Environmental Education program for K-12 students that was recognized by the Houston Audubon Society and awarded the Lucie Wray Todd Environmental Education Award. Laurie holds a BA from Principia College and is a Certified Permaculture Designer as well as a Certified Naturalist.


Western Reserve Historical Society (WRHS) was founded in 1867 to preserve and present the history of

Plan Your Visit to Costa Rica

The Montessori Institute for the Science of Peace (MISP) and the Friends of the Children's Eternal Rainforest (FCER) in collaboration with The University for Peace (UPEACE) are pleased to present an authentic learning experience that incorporates tropical ecology, peace education, activism, scientific study, and travel abroad in Costa Rica, all specifically designed for Montessori students.

MISP-FCER offers both 9 and 10 night learning adventures to Costa Rica that maximize meaningful peace education and scientific research. Costs range from \$1282 to \$1324 per person for a minimum of 15 travelers including Costa Rica ground travel and food (airfare not included). With prior approval from FCER-MISP, trips are customizable to fit your group's needs. Changes may incur additional expenses and are dependent upon staff and lodging availability.
